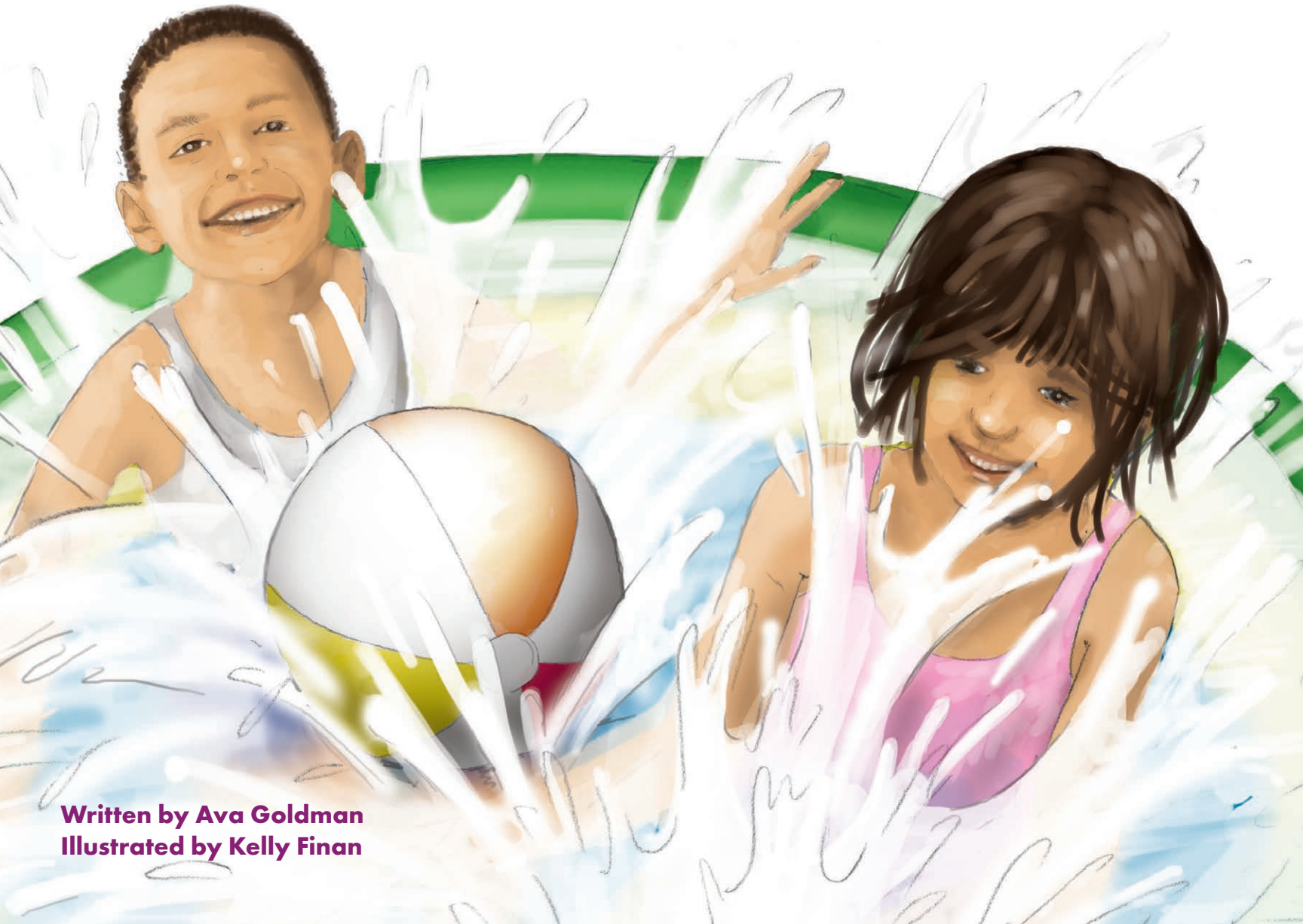

the blue stripe!” they shouted.



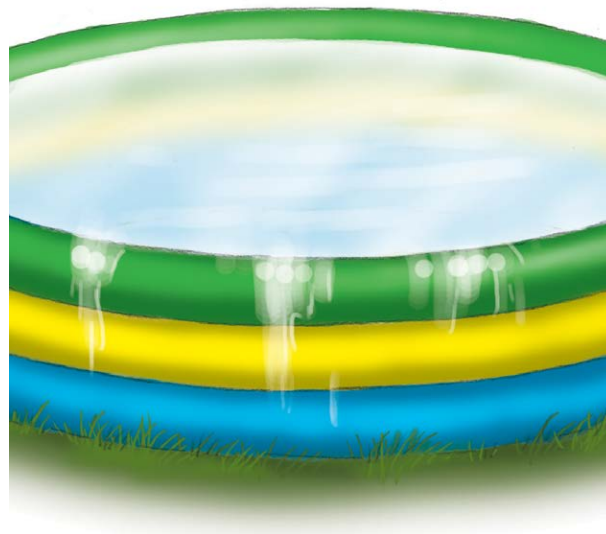
They poured buckets
